

MAKING A AIR DRYING SYSTEM FOR YOUR ENGINE BY FRANK RUSSO 2/14/07

Items required

1 5LB container INDICATING SILICA GEL (veritemp.com) cost with shipping 28 15

1 aquarium air pump (Wal-Mart Tetra whisper pump for 10 to 30 gal aquariums) 13 97

1 aquarium air supply line (Wal-Mart 8 ft) 1 33

1 aquarium air diffusers filters (Wal-Mart) one package contains four and they look like white hollow tubes about 2 inches long and pencil size in diameter with one end plugged 1.97

2 packages, one red & one blue Sullivan or Goldberg Golden push rods for model airplanes

(Sonoma Hobbies on Broadway Street) or can be any hard plastic line 4 to 5mm(3/16-inch) OD

Cost can vary on length of line and your scrounging abilities, need about one foot per bottle 9.00?

2 clear plastic soda bottles 24 OZ to 33-Oz size 0.00

Total (prices are approximate 2007) max cost to make \$ 54

There is enough silica gel to make four bottles if you want to reduce the number of recharging cycles.

Just add another package of air diffusers and make them up.

Schematic

[Air pump]-----[desiccant silica gel] ----[engine oil cap or engine vent]



To make the desiccant bottles: Drill two holes in the soda bottle caps, a tight fit for the air inlet and outlet lines will assure a good seal. The air inlet line (blue) should reach to the bottom of the bottle. The outlet line (red) only needs to be long enough to clear the neck of the bottle so that the filter diffuser will be within the top portion of the bottle. The blue inlet line needs to be lightly sanded where the hot glue will have to adhere to the inside of the diffuser filter. about the last ½ inch of one end that will be at the bottom of the soda bottle. Hot glue the filter diffusers at the bottom of both the inlet tube and the outlet tube.

After adjusting the tubes in the empty soda bottles where you want them, hot glue them on the outside top of the cap to make a good seal and to keep them in place.

Load the bottle with silica gel to approximately the base of the neck allowing space for the long inlet tube and the outlet filter diffusers. Gently insert the blue line into the loaded bottle twisting it in and insert the outlet filter diffuser, then screw on the

Attached a short length of line from the air pump to the blue inlet line and turn on the pump to check that the same amount of air going into the blue inlet is coming out at the red outlet end. You should make sure that the outlet line has a filter that is adequate enough for keeping silica dust from getting into your engine. This is the reason for the filter diffusers on the in and out lines, you can use any other method you like. I have

used a bubble stone only on the outlet line before with success, but now with double protection it really does not matter what line is used for in or out, and you really do not need to color code them. I prefer to have the inlet air from the pump going to the bottom of the bottle and the outlet air exit the top, with the bottles in the upright position. You could actually lay the bottles down or in any position and it will work fine.

Assembling the system: I use two bottles ganged in series so that when the first bottle is all pink and the second bottle is just starting to change in color to pink I then know to change the first bottle and recharge the desiccant. Attach an airline from the outlet of the bottle to the engine oil tank, or vent line in some way, tape for a temporary system is one way. When going into the vent you will need a hard plastic line with foam plug about 4 inches from one end, to get above your ice relief hole that all engine vent lines should have. Make sure that the foam plug is completely removed from the vent before you go flying. Also if you go through the vent you should crack open your oil cap for the dry air to have an exit.

To recharge the desiccant: Evenly spread, up to ½ inch thick, the silica gel in a metal container. I use a broiler drip pan or deep sided cookie sheet and place in the oven at 250 to 300 degrees for 2 to 3 hours until they turn back to a blue color. Allow cooling, I usually try to cover them, out of the oven, so that they don't absorb more moisture then necessary while cooling. Place the recharged silica gel in an airtight container until needed.

The MSDS sheet on silica gel said that it is non-toxic, however the cobalt chloride blue crystals are harmful. Avoid ingesting or breathing the dust.
